- Two fundamental human factors that naturally divide Strategy and Tactics
- How to keep them together

Origin of "Strategy"

 The word derives from the Greek word stratēgos, which derives from two words: stratos (army) and ago (ancient Greek for leading). Stratēgos referred to a 'military commander' during the age of Athenian Democracy - Around 500 BC

The Order

First comes talking, then comes action

- Without Strategy, Tactics will fail
- Without Tactics, Strategy will fail

Both are needed for success in any endeavour

Too Much Strategy

- Applying Strategy without Tactics is all talk but no action
- Nothing actually gets done!

Too Much Tactics

 Tactics without Strategy is "the blind leading the blind"

 Too busy cutting down the tree to stop and sharpen the saw

Ready - Fire - Aim!

Human Factor on Strategy

- People are generally fearful of commitment (a trait learnt when younger – don't make mistakes!!)
- This leads to too much <u>strategy</u>, too much talking!
- Nothing gets done

Human Factor on Tactics

- People are also fearful of being accused of not being productive (another trait learned when young – you must be busy to be successful!!)
- This leads to lots of <u>tactics</u> doing, but nothing planned
- The Wrong things get done

To Top It Off

- To a Tactician, Strategists appear noncommittal, airy-fairy, light headed, fanciful
- To a Strategist, Tacticians appear hard headed, dogmatic, aggressive, single minded

They don't tend to mix very well!!

3 Opposite Drivers

- Not Making a Commitment for Fear of Making Mistakes Increases Strategy and Decreases Tactics – <u>Nothing</u> gets done
- Fear of not looking busy Decreases Strategy and Increases Tactics – The <u>Wrong</u> things get done
- Strategists don't understand tacticians and tacticians don't understand strategists

 It is the balance that is important, and each project has it's own balance point

- Some projects require lots of strategy and not much tactics
- Some require very little strategy and lots of tactics
- Some require an equal mix
- Experience tells what is required

The Best Culture

- Ignore mistakes
- Ignore time keeping

- Focus on output
- Measure performance

 Recognise the important of the balance of Strategy and Tactics
